

The round-table discussion aims to assess and determine the current situation of U.S.-American history as an academic (sub-)field within German universities, schools as well as within German society in general. It will tackle three core questions and themes:

- (1) As student numbers decline and chairs are being re-categorized or disappear completely, how do we position ourselves within the field of history and American Studies in Germany as well as within the international field of American history?
- (2) Many of us teach students who become teachers. In many states U.S.-American history is part of the curriculum or even the Abitur. How can we reach out to teachers – how can they reach out to us? How can we work together?
- (3) Moreover, even if, as historians, we know the current political situation is neither entirely unique nor unchangeable, it does affect our work. What role can (or should?) historians of the USA and transatlantic relations play in the public sphere? Our work, for example, can put the current situation into perspective. We can also unpack complexities as memorializing, for example the Cold War, becomes a mainstream political issue.
